This year's **ASA**, **CSSA**, **and SSSA Annual International Meeting** held in sunny Long Beach, California was a huge success, with 984 graduate students taking part and a total of 4,205 attendees in total, from 51 countries.

Highlights of the program for Graduate Students included:

Fifty graduate students were selected from across the Societies to take part in the two-day inaugural **Graduate Student Leadership Conference** prior to the annual meeting, to help them develop the leadership and professional skills required to excel in their fields. The conference included sessions on communication, leadership characteristics, conflict resolution, extension and teaching. Participants had the opportunity to develop their networks and meet with Society leaders. Speakers at the conference included Sheri Harsch-Porter of Porter Bay, and professional communications expert Preston Ni. Consider applying for next year's Graduate Leadership Conference.

Career Fair and Consultations



It wasn't all socializing at this year's meeting! Graduates had the opportunity to meet with potential employers at the career fair (sponsored by Dow Agrosciences). STEM Career Consultant Alana Levine also conducted one-onone 20 minute consultations, sponsored by the ASA, CSSA, and SSSA Career Center, covering topics such as resume writing, interview skills and more. This was a unique opportunity for job-seeking graduates to get expert advice on furthering their career. The ASA-CSSA-SSSA Early Career Committee ran a series of Professional Development Workshops

aimed at enhancing the skills required in the job application process, preparing a manuscript for publication and succeeding as an early career researcher. These sessions were made up of expert panels and provided guidance in some of the biggest challenges faced by graduate students. And, the ASA-CSSA-SSSA Graduate Student Committee developed a Networking and Mentoring Session!
