### <sup>1</sup> Tours

*Soils of the Brazos Valley and Central Texas* – the tour will include soil pits near College Station and views of soils in surrounding counties. Guides will provide information about soil fertility and productivity of local soils.

*Forage Systems of Central and East Texas* – the tour will demonstrate the importance of winter pastures to the livestock industry with stops at local ranches.

*Urban Soil, Plant and Environmental Sciences* – this tour will showcase the influence of soil, plant, and environmental sciences in an urban setting. Stops will include those related to turfgrass, building sites dealing with soil and water related issues, environmental water quality, and the TAMU Howdy Farm (an urban, student organic horticulture farm).

*Plant Breeding* – Texas A&M University is a leader in plant breeding research and education. Stops will include the Borlaug Center (biotechnology), the USDA-ARS research facilities (cotton, perennial grass and pecans), as well as the TAMU plant breeding programs of corn, sorghum, cotton, wheat, perennial grass, and vegetables.

### <sup>2</sup>International Agriculture Symposium

This two hour event will include speakers from the Borlaug Institute, CIMMYT, IITA, IRRI, and TAMU SCSC faculty that have been closely engaged with international agriculture research and development in the spirit of our most famous faculty member– Dr. Norman Borlaug.

### <sup>3</sup>Hunger Banquet

This unique experience allows participants to actively engage in global hunger's uneven and cruel affliction of mankind. It will demonstrate the consequences of poverty and hunger as well as provide discussion points about solutions.

#### <u>Venue</u>

The Friday registration, dinner and speaker will be at the newly renovated Memorial Student Center (MSC) on the Texas &M University campus. The Saturday officer meetings can take place in the Heep Building on campus. The International Agriculture Symposium and Hunger Banquet will take place in the MSC.

#### <u>Local Travel</u>

Bus travel within a 50 mile radius of College Station will be contracted through the TAMU Transit System at a rate of \$80/hour. Buses will run from the hotels to campus venues.

# **Travel Options**

College Station has a regional airport with multiple connecting flights ( $\geq$ 4) per day to Dallas (American Airlines) and Houston (Continental). The Austin airport is about 1.5 hours away and has most major carriers including Southwest Airlines. Houston has two major airports. The George Bush International is about two hours away from College Station (depending on traffic) and is a major hub for Continental Airlines and has connections with most other major carriers. The Hobby Airport in Houston is about 2.5 hours away (depending on traffic) and has Southwest Airlines. There are shuttle buses that travel from the Houston airports to College Station that are reasonably priced.

# **Lodging**

College Station has several options for lodging. We are currently negotiating room rates. We believe we can secure double rooms for less than \$80 per night which will include a breakfast on Saturday morning. However, the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament if scheduled for that weekend and we are meeting resistance. Because of the size of the group, two hotels will likely be used. Both will be close (within 3 miles) of the campus.
